(Note: When solved, each clue is designed to name an item that must be brought to the Huntmaster in the shoebox provided to each team. This piece of information will narrow down your

quest considerably.)

May Treasure Hunt Questions:

1. The Whore of Mensa (you don't have to be exact).
2. You could find one between 10th and 11th Avenues, just north of Taylor St. (in Portland)
3. Create a 5 x 5 (Boggle) square of letters containing as many names (no abbreviations) of the fifty states as possible. List the states contained in your square and score one point for each letter in the name of each state. You may move from letter to letter vertically, horizontally, or diagonally. Each of your letters may be used only once in each state's name. OHIO would require two Os in your square.

1. This anagram said, "Don't leave home without it." Reference was made to an American Express credit card. Any CREDIT CARD was accepted.
2. The significant years associated with the names were substituted into the formula. $1912 - 1865 + 1871 - 1906 = 12$. A loan of 12 CENTS was sought.
3. This cryptogram said, "Holding good cards may be attributed to luck; playing them well, to skill. Show us some good ones." Any CARDS were acceptable.
4. A QUARTER (two bits). George Towner presented this at the 1980 AG in San Francisco. Rumor is that no one solved it.
